Social Studies Theme: Citizenship

Lesson: Values and Symbols

Grade Level: 1-4

Overview: The U.S. Flag and the Statue of Liberty are meaningful symbols of our country and stand for our collective values as Americans.

Approximate Duration: one class period

Objective: Students will be able to identify what a symbol is by studying two vital symbols of the United States. They will understand the purpose, importance and significance of each to their country and its citizens.

Procedure:

- Discuss with students what a symbol is, clarifying that a symbol is a picture or object that stands for an idea, feeling, or belief. Display different symbols, such as the non-smoking sign, the peace symbol, a dove, and the skull and cross bones. Talk about what each symbol stands for. Then ask students to brainstorm any symbols they can think of that stand for our country and have them tell what they think they symbolize
- After students fully understand the idea of a symbol, display an American flag and ask students to talk about what they think the flag stands for or symbolizes. Talk about the 50 stars that stand for the fifty states, and then ask them what they think the stripes might represent. Ask students to tell when they might use a flag and tell why they think a flag is important to the people in our country.
- Show a picture of the Statue of Liberty and tell students where it stands. Read aloud quotes that people have said or written about the Statue of Liberty. Then have students discuss what the statue means to them.

Assessment:

- Ask them to illustrate their sentences.
