Make it a classroom competition!

Your Classroom Victory Garden can inspire good-natured competition between your students as they learn about tomatoes and teamwork. Here's how:

- 1. Divide your students into teams.
- 2. Give them garden names such as the *Carrot-tops, the Sweet Peas and the Cabbage Heads.*
- 3. Have each team take responsibility for their plot to grow, water, and chart their garden's progress.
 - a. They can decorate their charts with their group names
- 4. They can share their progress in a daily/weekly/monthly presentation to the rest of the class
- 5. The groups can share their successes and work together to solve any gardening problems
- 6. This option really highlights the teamwork that took place during World War II when many people came together to grow community gardens.

Additional Option: Give each group a different vegetable seed to plant (corresponding to their group name)

- a. At the end of the project, each group can present on their vegetable- what they have learned about it, how it grew etc. using their garden chart
- b. Once each group has presented, the class can have a Salad Party and get to taste all of their delicious vegetables!

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
